## Working in Cold Conditions

- What makes cold temperatures dangerous?
  - Hypothermia
  - Frost bite
  - Dehydration
  - Strains and Pulls





- Body attempts to maintain core temperature (98.6°F)
- Decreasing blood flow to extremities
  - Keeps internal organs warm
  - Increases chance of frostbite


### Hypothermia

- Progressive loss of body heat
- Accelerates when wet from water or sweat
  - Most cases occur between 30°F and 50°F
  - Can occur in temperatures as high as 65°F
  - Can occur in 72°F water



## Mild Hypothermia

- Shivering and chattering teeth
- Blue lips and fingers
- Poor coordination



## Moderate Hypothermia

- Mental impairment and confusion
- Disorientation and poor decision making
- Inability to take precautions from the cold
- Slower heart and breathing rates
- Slurred speech

## Severe Hypothermia

- Resembles death
- Unconsciousness
- Irregular or hard-to-find pulse
- No shivering
- No detectable breathing

## FROSTBITE CAUT!ON

Since skin may be numb, victims of frostbite can harm themselves further.

Use caution when treating frostbite and:

## Dehydration

- Common problem in cold conditions
  - Tend to feel less thirsty
  - Sweat due to exertion or thick clothing
- Important to drink plenty of fluids



#### Strains and Pulls

- More common in colder temperatures
- Layer clothing
- Allow extra time to stretch and warm up prior to engaging in physically demanding activities







#### Winter Driving

- Pay attention to maintenance
- Use wipers, lights, etc.
- Clear windshield completely
- Allow more time
- Slow down
- Brake gradually
- Watch for ice
- Drive defensively
- Wear sunglasses



#### Stranded?

- Call for help
- Stay in the car
- Make car visible
- Run heat only periodically
- Travel with supplies




#### Emergency Preparedness Plan

- Assign responsibility to initiate the plan
- Establish contingency plans for staffing, fuel, equipment, fire protection, strategic shutdown, etc.
- Close facilities or delay opening or keep nonessential personnel out of the facility.
- Communicate with all employees, both on premises and off
- Train employees on applicable policies

#### Facility Preparation

- Inspect buildings including idle facilities, equipment, etc.
- Schedule annual heating system maintenance in advance
- Maintain buildings at 40°F or above
- Install thermometers, especially in hard-to-heat areas
- Insulate piping
- Inspect roofs and create a snow removal plan
- Do not send workers onto the roof if it is in danger of collapse
- Drain equipment and lines that contain water
- Clear snow to designated snow placement areas
- Block walking areas under roof overhangs to prevent falling snow from creating a hazard
- Place "walk-off" mats at entries during periods of rain or snow



#### In the Event of an Incident

- Assist the person; provide comfort.
- Call an ambulance if necessary
- Do not admit liability
- Follow reporting procedures
- Document the scene immediately
- Take photos
- Conduct an accident investigation
